INTRODUCTION

The principal object of this work is to exhibit a method of pointing by means of which any Psalm may be chanted to any one of the eight Tones. In places where Antiphons are in use, as in the Chapels of Religious Communities, some such system is obviously necessary, inasmuch as the melody of the Antiphon determines the Tone and Ending to which its accompanying Psalm is to be sung. Elsewhere, Quire-masters can use their own discretion as to the choice of Tones and Endings.¹

The method of pointing here adopted consists in the employment of the figures 1 to 8, answering to the Eight Tones. These figures are placed above the syllable on which the Mediation or Ending of the corresponding Tone begins, *i.e.* the syllable on which the reciting note is left. The Tone being once chosen, the singers must confine their attention to its corresponding figure in each half of the verse,² *all the other figures being disregarded.*

The principles on which the pointing is regulated are based on the examples found in the Sarum and other English Antiphonals.

The forms of the Tones, with the order of their Endings, are from the Sarum *Tonale*, with additional Endings from other English sources, as shewn in the Table of Tones.

The notation employed is that which is found in English MSS. of the xijth—xvth centuries, of which the following characters are used in this work :—

1. The Staff of four lines.

2. The two Clefs, C  and F  which indicate the position of those notes upon the Staff.³

¹ In this edition one or more of the simpler Tones have been prefixed to each Psalm. These are suggested as having been found by experience to work well, but are not intended to preclude the use of others which may happen to be preferred.

² It will be seen that in a few of the *Endings* of certain Tones, the figure will not serve to indicate the pointing; the reason being that in these Endings the Reciting-note is left sooner, or later, than in those which are more frequently used, and to which the figures apply. See pp. xv—xxi.

³ There is no fixed pitch in Plainsong; the Clef-notes can therefore be transposed at will.

3. The Flat, used only with the note B.

4. The <i>Punctum</i>		a single note, the value of which is determined by the syllable to which it is sung.
5. The <i>Pes</i> or <i>Podatus</i>		an ascending group of two notes.
6. The <i>Clavis</i>		a descending group of two notes.
7. The <i>Torculus</i>		a triplet.
8. The <i>Climacus</i>		a group of three or more descending notes.
9. The <i>Pes</i> <i>subpunctis</i>		
10. The <i>Climacus</i> <i>resupinus</i>		Composite groups.

The note-groups in the above list are merely representations of the original 'neums,' and in no case does the form of a note express either its force or duration. Thus the tailed note is not in itself a long, nor the lozenge a short note.

In every group, whether ascending or descending, it is the initial note which receives the *ictus* or impulse of the voice, and from it the second and following notes should flow, in smooth and connected succession. This initial note is not necessarily a strongly accented one: like the single note (No. 4), its force is precisely that of the syllable to which it is allied. In groups of two notes, the second should always be softly sung.

When a group occurs at the close of the Mediation or Ending, if it consist of two notes, both should be slightly retarded; if of three or four, such as Nos. 7 or 8, it will be sufficient to prolong the last note only. But in the case of composite groups, such as Nos. 9 or 10, the *rallentando* affects the two last notes only, as though they were

It will be seen from the foregoing Table that every Tone consists of three melodic inflexions, the Intonation, the Mediation and the Ending. Of these, the first and second are (as regards the Psalms) invariable, whereas the third is found in more or less variety. Each of these must be considered separately.

I. The INTONATION. In the Psalms this is used in the *first* verse only ; but when two or more Psalms are sung to the same Tone and Ending, the Intonation should not be repeated. In the two principal Gospel Canticles, *Benedictus* and *Magnificat*, the Intonation has a more ornate form,¹ and is used in *every* verse. The Canticles *Benedicite*, *Quicunque* and *Nunc dimittis* are treated as Psalms.²

The Intonation of the Psalm-tones being in all cases (except that of the Irregular Tone) strictly syllabic, it follows that when the first half of the opening verse of a psalm contains an insufficient number of syllables for both Intonation and Mediation to be sung in their complete form, one or other of them must be altogether omitted, or one of them (in some cases both) must be abbreviated. The following is a list of these exceptional cases :—

(a) *Entire omission of the Mediation.*





² The Psalm *Venite exultemus* has from a very early period occupied an important position as the introductory Canticle at Mattins. It was never sung to an ordinary Psalm-tone, (except on the Feast of Epiphany, when it occurred in the course of the Psalms of the third Nocturn), but had its own special Tones, which are probably as ancient as any Plain-chant we possess. Some of these have been adapted to the English text by the Editor of this work. The Easter Anthem *Pascha nostrum* has in this edition been set to one of the

(d) *Entire omission of the Intonation.*

This will be found necessary if Tone IV be used with any Psalm in (a), (b) or (c), or with Psalms 23, 46, 63, 76, 119 (v. 145), 131, 134 or 148. The Intonation must also be omitted when Tones III & VII are sung to Psalms 23, 63, 76 or 119 (v. 145), or when Tone III is used with Psalm 134.

II. The MEDIATION. This is the inflexion which immediately precedes the colon, or division of the verse. There are eight Mediations, one for each Tone.¹ Two of these, viz. I & VI, have no *fixed*

above-mentioned *Venite-tones*. *Te Deum*, being a Hymn, has its own traditional melody, and was never intended to be treated Psalm-wise. The pointing of the verses by colons, giving it the *appearance* of a Psalm, was an unauthorized introduction of the xvith century, & the setting of it to Psalm-tones, which was given in previous editions of this book, has now been withdrawn, and its own proper melody has been substituted.

The other six may be classified as follows :—

Four } Mediations of { *one accent*, viz. II, IV, V & VIII.
Two } { *two accents*, viz. III & VII.

Each of these Mediations has, besides its *ordinary* or normal form, an exceptional or *abrupt* method of treatment.

In Mediations of *one* accent this abrupt form is used whenever the syllable immediately before the colon is either an emphatic monosyllable,¹ or the final syllable of an iambic or anapæstic word.

In Mediations of *two* accents the abrupt form is used whenever there is an insufficient number of syllables, or when a strongly accented syllable occurs in the antepenultimate place.


The practical working of these will be seen from the following Tables. The blank note □ is used, both here and elsewhere, to indicate the treatment of redundant syllables.


¹ The *abrupt* form of these Mediations when the final monosyllable is weak, or is in the nature of an enclitic, has now been abandoned. Practical experience has shewn that both rhythm and sense are in many instances seriously affected by its use. A similar course has been followed in the case of Hebrew proper names.

III. The ENDING, or DIFFERENCE. This is the inflexion which concludes the Tone. There are 41 Endings in the Sarum *Tonale*,¹ to which 14 have been added from other English sources. Two of these, IV. 7 & 9, have no *fixed* accent, the first note of the Ending always falling on the penultimate syllable, whether accented or not, e.g.

The others may be classified as follows :

Forty three Endings of *one* accent, viz. those of I, II, III, IV (except 7 & 9), VI & VIII, together with V. 3 & VII. 8.

VIII. 3 is not, strictly speaking, an Ending, but an inflexion which was commonly used as a *metrum* or Mediation in the chanting of the Lessons, Benedictions and Short Chapters in the Quire-Services. As the Ending of a Psalm-tone it is found in the Sarum *Tonale*, but is assigned to three Psalms only, viz. 130, 145 & 147 (vv. 1—11), when sung at Vespers on Ferias. It has not been suggested for use in this edition, as its pointing greatly depends on the accentuation of the last four syllables. But if used, it must be remembered that when the final syllable is emphatic, and is preceded by two syllables of less importance, the reciting-note is left on the former of these, and the final note of the Ending is necessarily omitted. In such cases the figure 8 will not indicate the pointing, as the following examples will shew:—



Where the final syllable is weak, the ordinary pointing of Tone VIII must be followed.

The Irregular or *Peregrine* Tone is probably of Byzantine origin, and was introduced into France in the ixth century. Even in the xth century it was styled *tonus novissimus*, and it was not till the beginning of the xjth that it came into general use. Since that time it has been included in the various *Tonalia* under the head of Tone VIII. Owing to the complex nature of its Ending (as given in English MSS.) it requires to be noted throughout to any Psalm or Canticle with which it is used. (*Cf.* pp. 252, 266 & 274).

N.B. A full point to the left of the figure 4 (and, more rarely, of figures 6 & 8) in the second half of a verse, will occasionally be met with in the course of the Psalter, (*e.g.* in Pss. xxxv. 5 & 6, lxiij. 10, & cxij. 6). Where this occurs, it will be found desirable to prefix the Reciting-note to the first note of the Ending.

ON THE CHOICE OF TONES AND ENDINGS

It has been already stated that where Antiphons are in use, the Antiphon determines both the Tone and its Ending. But where

they are not in question, the simpler Tones for the Psalms are much to be preferred. At the same time, it must be admitted that there are some Psalms in which, if Tones II, IV, V or VIII were chosen, the constant recurrence of the abrupt Mediation would have an unpleasing, not to say tiresome, effect. In such cases, those Tones are best avoided.

As regards the Endings, the more ornate ones should, as a rule, be restricted to the Gospel Canticles. Moreover, amongst these ornate Endings there are a few which have such a lack of 'finality' that they cannot be recommended for general use. Such are I. 7, III. 3, IV. 2 & 3, and VIII. 4. These are examples of what is called *epithesis* or augmentation. They are, in fact, extensions of simpler forms, and were intended to meet or 'dovetail into' the opening phrase of some particular Antiphon. Thus I. 7 is merely an augmented form of I. 5, III. 3 of III. 7, IV. 2 & 3 of IV. 1, & VIII. 4 of VIII. 6. These Endings are undoubtedly relics of a time when the Antiphon was sung alternately with every verse of the Psalm. There are, however, other instances of *epithetic* Endings, such as I. 6 (from I. 5), IV. 5 (from IV. 4), V. 2 (from V. 1) & VII. 4 (from VII. 3), which may be quite legitimately used.

HINTS FOR CHANTING

- (1) Remember that the *words* are of the first importance.
- (2) Do not mistake *accent* for *length*. *Accent* is merely the momentary stress or impulse of the voice given to a particular syllable, and never involves a *lengthening* of that syllable.
- (3) In the recitation, remember that no syllable, however strong, should be *prolonged*, and that no syllable, however weak, should be *clipped*. Some syllables have more weight than others, and consequently take a little more time to articulate; but, this being duly allowed for, the recitation should be as *even*, and the syllables as nearly *equal* in length as is consistent with good reading. Any tendency to measured rhythm, (such as that of a dotted crotchet followed by a quaver,) must be sedulously avoided.
- (4) In both Mediation and Ending, the syllable which takes the *final* musical accent should be slightly retarded, (where it will bear it).

(5) There should be a *marked* pause, or rather *silence*, at the colon in every verse. To ensure this, it is suggested that the singers should mentally repeat the two previous syllables, (e.g. 'féar him', 'Gén-tiles'); or, in the case of the second syllable being strongly accented, (e.g. 'his árm', 'have séen',) should consider that syllable as of double length.

(6) All Hebrew words should be pronounced *more Romano*.

The two clauses of the 'Gloria Patri' should be sung *alternately*, like the rest of the Psalm, and *not* by the full Quire. (See the rubrick following the Ps. *Venite* at Mattins.)

The pointing is here given once for all :—

Glory be to the Fa-ther, and to the Son : and to the holy Ghost.
